### **Frequently Asked Questions**

What is the Summer Journalism Program (SJP)?

SJP is an intensive, one-week program in journalism for high school students. The free program is run entirely by Yale undergraduates, who are also staff members of the Yale Daily News. SJP is based at the Yale Daily News building on the campus of Yale University in New Haven, Conn.

What do SJP participants do?

Students participate in workshops on the fundamentals of journalism, attend lectures by guest speakers from major news outets such as the New York Times, the Huffington Post, and ABC News, and receive mentorship from staff of the Yale Daily News. Throughout the week, they gain hands-on experience by pitching, reporting on and writing their own stories and taking photographs. At the end of the week, they produce an issue of the Yale Daily News. The program is not designed to teach writing basics.

Who can apply?

The program is limited to Connecticut high school students — Connecticut residents and students who attend Connecticut boarding schools — and is geared toward those with journalism experience. However, any Connecticut high school student with an interest in journalism or writing is encouraged to apply.

### 10 A.M.

Students arrive and begin a workshop on one of the most important skills in journalism: writing ledes, the informative and catchy first lines of articles that draw readers in.

A well-known guest speaker discusses how she and her peers are ensuring that quality journalism survives the shift to the onlineformat.

### 2 P.M.

Students break into teams that go out into different parts

of New Haven, looking for stories. Each team is guided by an SJP co-director, a staff reporter for the Yale Daily News.

### 3 P.M.

The teams regroup to put together a story based on their interviews.
